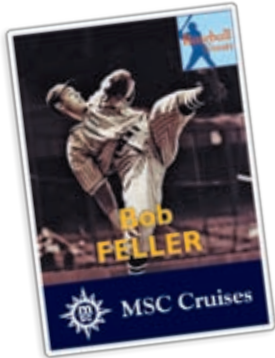

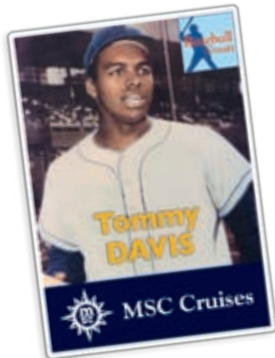
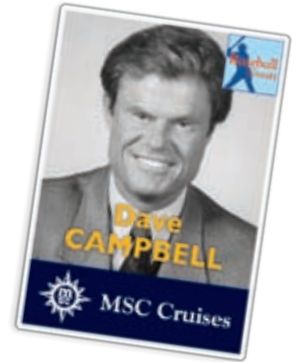


Bob Feller

The winningest pitcher in Cleveland Indians history, Bob Feller in 1962 became the first pitcher since charter member Walter Johnson to be elected to the Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. With the encouragement of his father, young Feller pitched to a makeshift backstop on the family farm near Van Meter, Iowa. A Cleveland scout signed him for \$1 and an autographed baseball. Feller earned the reputation as the fastest pitcher of his day, though he also had a curve and slider. During his career, he pitched three no-hitters – only Nolan Ryan and Sandy Koufax pitched more – and a record 12 one-hitters. The eight-time All-Star and his blazing fastball led the league in wins six times and strikeouts seven times. His career was interrupted by a four-year stint with the Navy in the South Pacific during World War II. He returned to the diamond in 1946 to win 26 games and strike out 348. Even with the break in his career for military service, he still won a total of 266 games.

Dave Cambell

Ballplayer-turned-broadcaster Dave Campbell (“Soup”) was a utility infielder with the Tigers and Padres. As a regular in 1970, he hit 12 home runs in 581 at bats. He successfully made the transition to the broadcast booth, where he is now an award-winning announcer for ESPN, calling games and hosting *Baseball Tonight*. Today, Campbell is regarded as one of the best-prepared broadcasters working Major League Baseball and is a virtual “walking encyclopedia” on our National Pastime.

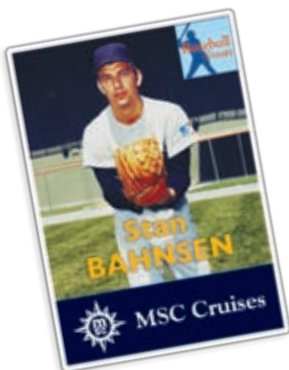
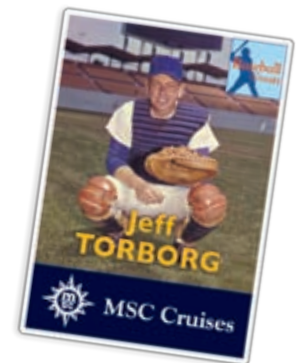


Tommy Davis

Tommy Davis had a stellar career as an outfielder with the Dodgers, Mets, Astros, Orioles, White Sox, A's and Seattle. A high school basketball standout, Jackie Robinson was instrumental in convincing Davis to sign with his hometown Brooklyn club in 1956. By the time Davis made the big leagues, however, the Dodgers had moved to Los Angeles. Considered one of the greatest right-handed line drive hitters of his era, Davis won back-to-back batting titles with the Dodgers in 1962 and 1963 (the first National Leaguer to capture successive batting crowns since Stan Musial did it in 1950-52). In 1962 he led the league with 230 hits, a .346 batting average and 153 RBIs – the most in the league in 25 years. His career included six seasons batting .300 or more and a lifetime batting average of .294 with more than 2,100 hits and 1,000 RBIs.

Jeff Torborg

Jeff Torborg was both a successful catcher and manager. His career began with the Los Angeles Dodgers, and several historic games: he caught Sandy Koufax's perfect game in 1965, Bill Singer's no-hitter in 1970, the fifth of Don Drysdale's six consecutive shutouts in 1968 and, as an Angel in 1973, he the first of Nolan Ryan's seven no-hitters. In 1977, he became the Cleveland Indians' manager, before spending 10 years with the New York Yankees. In 1989, Torborg joined the Chicago White Sox and a year later, he won 94 games – a 25-game improvement from 1989 – and was named American League Manager of the Year. Torborg has also managed the New York Mets, Montreal Expos and Florida Marlins. Since 2003, Torborg's has had a successful career as a sportscaster.



Stan Bahnsen

Stan Bahnsen (“The Bahnsen Burner”) was named American League Rookie of the Year as a Yankee in 1968, when he won 17 games with a 2.06 ERA. With a record 19 lifetime victories against the Yankees biggest American League rival, Bahnsen was known as a Red Sox killer. He won 21 games with the Chicago White Sox in 1972 and has a total of 146 lifetime victories. Bahnsen pitched for division-winning teams while with the A's and Expos and is ranked 11th on the Yankees' all-time ERA leaders list. He averaged 15 wins as a starting pitcher for nine years before becoming a setup-man for Oakland and Montreal for the last six years of his career.
